Decision

The programme syllabus is established by The pro-dean for First-Cycle Studies at the Faculties of Humanities and Theology 24-03-2015 to be valid from 24-03-2015, autumn semester 2015.

Programme description

The programme is designed for students intending to work within the cultural heritage, museum or research sectors. It combines theoretical and practical aspects intended to provide students with in-depth knowledge of the theories and methods in the main field of Archaeology and Ancient History with specialisations in Archaeology, Historical Archaeology, Classical Archaeology and Ancient History or Historical Osteology. The programme familiarises students with the technical and practical aspects of archaeology.

The two-year programme has a structure of a range of elective courses of 15 or 30 credits. Students also have the opportunity to freely select courses worth 30 credits at a department of their choice. The course ARKN15 Practical and Theoretical Field Archaeology, 30 credits, is the first one on the programme and is compulsory for all students unless they can document equivalent studies at another higher education institution. The fourth and last semester comprises a compulsory degree project of 30 credits in one of the specialisations.

Goals

Knowledge and understanding

- demonstrate a considerable degree of specialised knowledge in several key and specialised areas of the field of Archaeology and Ancient History
- demonstrate sophisticated knowledge and understanding of a broad spectrum of theories within the main field
- be able to apply a specialised understanding of relevant theories and methods in specific contexts
- demonstrate specialised methodological knowledge in at least one of the specialisations Archaeology, Historical Archaeology, Classical Archaeology and Ancient History or Historical Osteology
- demonstrate specialised insight into current research and development work in the main field
- be able to describe different types of archaeological evidence, how they are assembled and how different theoretical premises shape the actual process of documentation

Competence and skills

- demonstrate the ability to identify and formulate issues critically, autonomously and creatively
- demonstrate the ability to plan and, using appropriate methods, undertake advanced tasks of relevance to the main field within predetermined time frames and so contribute to the formation of knowledge as well as the ability to evaluate this work
- demonstrate the ability to critically and systematically integrate knowledge and analyse, assess and deal with complex phenomena, issues and situations even with limited information
- be able to use theoretical and practical tools to interpret, describe and reexamine past landscapes independently
- be able to independently search for information in a chosen field and analyse and interpret the information critically
- demonstrate the ability in speech and writing to report clearly and to discuss his or her conclusions and the knowledge and arguments on which they are based in dialogue with different audiences
- demonstrate the skills required for participation in research and development work or autonomous employment in some other qualified capacity

Judgement and approach

- be able to evaluate assumptions about social identity, gender and ethnicity in the past on the basis of acquired knowledge
- demonstrate the ability to make assessments informed by relevant disciplinary, social and ethical issues and demonstrate awareness of ethical aspects of research and development work
- be able to discuss cultural heritage issues in an informed manner
- demonstrate the ability to identify the personal need for further knowledge and take responsibility for his or her ongoing learning.

Course information

The programme consists of:

- 1. A compulsory course in Practical and Theoretical Field Archaeology (30 credits).
- 2. A compulsory degree project course for each specialisation (30 credits).
- 3. Optional courses within the programme (60 credits).

Requirements and Selection method

Requirements

To be admitted to the programme, applicants must have a first-cycle degree in one of the main fields of Archaeology, Historical Archaeology, Classical Archaeology and Ancient History or Historical Osteology or the equivalent.

Selection method

Based on academic qualifications and a letter of intent.

Other information

The programme is normally taught in English. It can be taught in Swedish if an agreement is reached by both the lecturers and the students. Such an agreement would depend on both the lecturers and the students having a good knowledge of Swedish.
